Holly	• My first impression is that several themes emerge that folks identified. The most significant conference experiences tend to involve interactive and small group events like SIGs and Caucuses;, and that there was a lot of enthusiasm for the TYCA conference.	
Chris	 Panels: Widespread support, many comments on more interactive panels that aren't just people reading papers. Also positive comments about seeing more practical topics SIGs: Widespread support. Biggest issue that came up was that they're all at the same time Workshops: Widespread support and attendance. A large number called out the RNF specifically. Social Events/Networking: Surprisingly popular response, both for formal and informal events. Keynote: About half a dozen negative mentions and several times that many either implied positive or wholly enthusiastic. Mentoring/Newcomers: Fewer than above, but still quite a few mentions of mentoring activities being important. A few requests for more newcomer resources and also a few comments about difficulty 	Prioritize locations that are big enough to be as centralized as Pittsburgh. Many people mentioned hallway conversations, bumping into people, and just the opportunity to talk between panels without having to rush between buildings. Along those lines, maybe more specially designated socializing areas for people to find each other between panels. The networking aspect of the conference is much bigger than I expected. We might also consider other free social events. Publisher parties seem to be waning a bit, and providing events that don't cost extra might provide spaces to meet and gather that don't require insider knowledge or special connections.
