Are you being targeted?

- If your safety or that of your family is threatened, report the threat immediately to both campus and local police. Have a support person with you when you make your report, particularly if you are a member of a historically oppressed or marginalized group.
- Log your conversations, including dates, times, locations, and substance.
- Log and save all email and post communication, screenshot all social media posts and direct messages, and save all voicemail.
- · Reach out to legal and professional support.

Are you an ally?

- If the safety of your colleague or their family is threatened, report the threat immediately to both campus and local police. Go with your colleague when they report a threat, particularly if they are a member of an historically oppressed or marginalized group.
- · Listen, believe, and be vocal in your support.
- · Log what you witness regarding your colleague's being targeted.
- Help your colleague identify and reach out to legal and professional support.
- Help your colleague to garner and organize widespread public support.
